Board of Directors Announce 2022-23 Slate of Officers

The Board of Directors met for their regularly scheduled meeting on the 10th of February. Following the Bylaws, Board President, LaVon Worley convened this first meeting of the new fiscal year by calling for election of officers for the new year. A poll of the current officers in addition to Worley were Mike Bloomer, Vice President; Don Weiss, Treasurer; and Paula Logan, Secretary. Worley asked for a continuation of this slate for the new year. All were willing to serve. Worley then asked for nominations for any of the positions from the remainder of the board members. There being no additional nominations, Worley called for a vote to retain the current officers for another year. All were in favor.

The Board has several major projects in the works for the coming year. In addition to completion of the Columbia Street entrance at the Heritage Museum, work is needed to be done at the Garrett-Phelps House. The front steps will require adaptation to meet safety standards. The back 2-story porch must be gutted and rebuilt. Both projects require guidance from the Historic Preservation Commission of the City of Burlington.

The DMCHS Board of Directors meets monthly on the second Thursday of each month. They strive to provide direction to staff and volunteers in order to achieve their stated mission and purpose while providing both educational and entertaining events for the community.

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

Out of the Attic: Central Valley Dalton

Spring is coming, and cabin fever is strong among some. For others, the urge to get out and hunt for fossils, arrowheads and spear points is getting stronger by the day. And with good reason! As the ice and snow melt, they can expose fossils and projectiles that were previously hidden to human eyes.

The object below is new to the DMCHS collection and is made of Burlington chert that has been heated in a fire, and then allowed to cool before being worked with bone, stone, and antler tools into its current shape. It has also caused a lot of confusion amongst the experts who have seen it.

There are several sub-types of the Dalton Complex Projectile Points. Not everyone agrees on which sub-types are valid, and which ones are not. Our projectile falls into the grey area in between. One expert thought that it could be an Upper Valley Dalton, or possibly a Northern Valley Dalton, while another thought that it could be a really beaten up Clovis. And. as of the date of this writing, the debate as to whether or not either the UVD or NVD sub types even exist is ongoing.

The Dalton Complex culture are thought to have been a successive culture to the Clovis, who are thought to have been among the first peoples in North America. There are a lot of similarities between Clovis and Dalton lithics (stone projectile points), which can lead to confusion, as is evidenced by our object.

The projectile was likely lashed to an atlatl dart, and was used to hunt game about 10,000 years ago +/- by the Paleo people who were among the first to inhabit Des Moines County. We know that they were hunter-gatherers, and left few traces behind for future archeologists to study. To date, there are no known Dalton or Clovis camp sites in the county.

What is even more confusing about the projectile is that we don't know who collected it, when they found it, or where. We do know that the projectile is part of a

larger collection of lithics and stone/rock samples that were recently donated with no background information. We think that it was collected in Des Moines County, as other similar lithics have been found in the area.

Want to find a similar lithic of your own? The experts recommend walking freshly ploughed fields, or waterways after the spring floods recede. They also stressed that you make sure that you have permission to walk private property when artifact hunting. Also, make sure that if you are hunting public lands, that collecting is allowed.

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"Downtown Freddie" Brown

One doesn't have to go very far to see Des Moines County can bring out the best in its people. While not born in Burlington, Fred Brown had a major impact in the world of basketball.

Anyone around Des Moines County and in particular at a Southeastern Community College (formerly known

as Burlington Junior College) basketball game in the late 1960's has heard the name "Downtown Freddie Brown". He was given the nickname "Downtown Freddie" Brown due to his outside shooting skills. This nickname followed him his entire career.

Brown graduated in 1967 from Lincoln High School in downtown Milwaukee. In high school, he led his team to two state titles and he made all-state many times as well. He lettered in football and baseball as well as basketball and he captained his 1967 basketball team.

He then attended junior college in Burlington, Iowa from 1967-1969 before moving up to the University of Iowa. While at the University of Iowa, he averaged 27.6 points per game his senior year. Upon graduation in 1971, he was immediately selected by the Kentucky Colonels in the American Basketball Association draft. However, it was the Seattle Supersonics who picked him up in the 1971 NBA draft at 6th pick overall. This is where he stayed until his retirement in 1984.

Playing behind Lenny Wilkens and Dick Snyder caused him to start off with a slow rookie season. Wilkens was traded to the Cleveland Cavaliers in 1972 and Brown saw more playing time and his average points per game went up to 13.5-16.5.

In 1974 Snyder was traded to the Cavs There Brown's scoring increased to 21 points per game. During this 1974-75 season he also finished fifth in the league in steals per game. His All Star season of 1975-76 saw him finish fifth in the NBA in scoring average and free throw percentage.

Continuing as a starter for the 1976-77 season and the beginning of the 1977-1978 season, he was then benched. When Lenny Wilkens took over as coach,


he brought in two newer players and brought Brown whom he dubbed "Instant Offence" off the bench.

The team made the NBA finals that season and the next. They won the NBA Championship in 1978-79 with Brown as captain of the team. It should be noted that Brown led the NBA in three point shooting percentage in 1979-80, which was the first season the three-point line was adopted by the league.

Brown's basketball career ended when he retired in 1984. He was the Sonics all-time leader in games played (963), points scored (14,018), field goals (6,006) and free throws (1,896). He still holds the record for the team's points in a regular season game with 58. He shares this honor with Russell Westbrook. He also holds record points in a playoff game with 45. He shares this honor with Ray Allen. Lastly, he has a team record steals in a game with 10. He shares this with Gus Williams.

On November 6, 1986 Brown's #32 SuperSonic jersey was retired in honor of his career with the Sonics.

Freddie Brown still resides in Seattle.
