### From the Executive Director

Riverboat season has now ended, and I want to thank all of the volunteers and staff who helped engage and escort our Viking Mississippi and American Queen guests around Burlington. Our museums were packed to the brim with people from all over the country and all over the world. We were ecstatic to have them be a part of the Heritage Center and Garrett-Phelps House, and we look forward to them returning in the summer and fall of 2024!

This month's newsletter will cover a variety of topics and reminders from October through November. On October 21st, at the Heritage Center, we had several events that brought in crowds of people. I provided a lecturebased concert on the history of funeral marches, death marches, disaster music, tearjerkers, and other morbid melodies our ancestors were familiar with. During this program, we served two historic funeral pies and funeral cookies similar to those made in the mid-victorian era. People were laughing and tearing up with joy over the music that croaked out of the Martin Bruhl piano.

We also continued the concert until October 26, 27, and 28 for a few hours, and then continued to host a Burlington Public Library Halloween story time for our museum families. Halloween is a popular holiday for families in museums, and if you would like to volunteer next year for our programs, please feel free to contact me.

Another program we wrapped up was our monthly teas at the Garrett-Phelps House. I want to thank our volunteers and staff for taking the time, collaborating, and executing this historic recreation in our house's dining room. Reservations will be open in 2024 for next year's tea. Similar to the teas, we are now fully booked this year for the Christmas dinners and will not be opening up for more nights.

As of November, we will not be having a Sounds of the Past Piano Program due to my needing to go home for the holidays. Both the Heritage Center and Garrett-Phelps House will be closed Thanksgiving Day and Black Friday so our staff and volunteers can be with their families.

Around this time of the year, the Iowa Museum Association puts out a theme for all of Iowa's museums to govern their events and programming. In 2024, the theme is "Power of Place", and we will be developing our programming and events around this topic. The power of place could be interpreted in a variety of ways. When I think of the term power of place, I think of Black Hawk Springs as a key survival source of fresh drinking water that benefited Indigenous travelers and early Des Moines County Settlers.

# Upcoming Events

#### Town Hall Lectures First Saturday of Every Month 12 to 3 pm

Every first Saturday of the month, the Heritage Center will host a speaker, historian, or lecturer to give a presentation to the community about a particular topic related to Burlington or Des Moines County. This program will typically be free for patrons; the only time admission is charged for this program is for **special** lectures. #### Taste of the Holidays December 2, 5, 7, and 9

This holiday dinner at the Garrett-Phelps house hosts up to 12 people per night. The night will start off in the library, where our volunteers will serve wine and refreshments. Light hors d'oeuvres will be served while guests socialize in the back parlor. When dinner is ready to be served, our interpreters will guide guests to be seated in the dining rooms. As dinner is being served, our historians will give a presentation of the Garrett-Phelps house and family heritage. #### **Hotel Burlington Orange Rolls**

Mix the zest of two oranges with 1 cup sugar and let it stand for 12 hours. Roll dough (see roll recipe below) like jelly rolls, spread with soft butter and orange sugar, cut into 1 inch slices, put in a pan, and let rise. Bake at 360 degrees for 10 minutes.

Glaze:  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup white Karo syrup, 1 cup sugar, and  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup hot (boiling) water. Boil for a few minutes. Add the rind of one orange, grated, and the juice of one orange. Let stand. It would be best if you made it the day before. Put orange glaze on rolls just after taking them from the oven and returning them to the oven for 2–3 minutes.

#### Ingredients

1 package rapid rise yeast - maximum temperature of
115 degrees on the warm water.
1 cup mashed potatoes
1 ¼ cup warm water
⅔ cup sugar
1 tsp. salt
⅔ cup Crisco
2 beaten eggs
5 - 5 ¼ cups flour

#### Directions

Prepare the package of yeast in <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup of warm water and 1 tsp. sugar. Set the yeast aside and let it activate. Put sugar, Crisco, and salt in the mixing bowl, then add the instant mashed potatoes that are dissolved in <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup of hot water. When the mixture reaches 115 degrees, add the beaten eggs, the yeast, and the flour. Keep the dough sticky and refrigerate until cool.



## Out of the Collection

Hotel Burlington at 206 N 3rd Street was a hotspot of local activity, events, and business for travelers and community members. The Hotel Burlington (1910-11) stands in the heart of the central business district located in the Hawkeye Creek Valley. Built as the tallest building in town, the hotel dominated the scene from the surrounding hills and all directions of travel. It is still the largest building downtown. The electric sign on top of the building and the new system of street lights made the building highly visible even at night. The hotel was designed in the Renaissance style, with major facades on Third and Valley (west and south-facing). The design was for a seven-story building in a "U" plan above a two-story main block. The major facades were built to seven stories in an "L" plan during 1910-11. The east wing, which runs along the alley and completes the "U"-shaped design, was constructed in 1923. Expansion in 1931 increased the height to nine stories.

Construction of Hotel Burlington was the grand culmination of an effort to create a visual and commercial hub for downtown. As a manufacturing town, Burlington grew up as a center for commercial travelers. Burlington businessmen had spent several years planning for the hotel, and financing the hotel entirely with local money was a benchmark in Burlington's effort to remain a leading commercial city in Iowa. The hotel project was necessary to maintain and strengthen the business ties between travelers and local manufacturing, wholesale, and retail concerns, as well as provide for convention and tourist use. The hotel was so popular and heavily used that it had to be expanded twice, with the projects following and utilizing the original design. A change in economic and traffic patterns had created the need for this facility. It became the largest, most luxurious, and the last hotel constructed in Burlington due to further changes in traffic and commercial patterns.

Recently added to our collection was a long-missing recipe from a bakery in the Hotel Burlington everyone was nostalgic over. When the hotel foreclosed in the 1980's, recipe ownership was transferred to Ilene Frank and her peers. See page 2 for the recipe, and tell us if you like it.
