#### From the Executive Director

With Viking Mississippi in full swing, hundreds of visitors from around the globe have visited Garrett-Phelps and the Heritage Center! We sincerely appreciate all of the effort that our volunteers and employees put forth to make our guests feel welcome. Making sure everyone gets from place to place when the summer heat is at its worst is a difficult task. However, we are driven to highlight Garrett-Phelps and the Heritage Center, two of Burlington's finest structures.

Regarding presenting our historic sites, we will be part of the Heritage Trust Tour of Homes starting on September 28 from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. and September 29 from 12:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. Tickets will be available for purchase at Garrett-Phelps, Heritage Center, Heritage Trust, and Houses on the Tour during the day of the tours.

Both locations are now in need of volunteers to help out and assist people around the museum sites. Personally, I'd like to hear perspectives about the Garrett-Phelps House before we update the displays, give it a thorough cleaning before winter, and improve accessibility.

Before the "Stacks" area is refurbished, there are still a lot of projects going on throughout the Heritage Center. We have cleaned and adjusted our mantle clock in the Grand Gallery. It runs surprisingly well for five days in a row before needing to be winded. It has to be observed occasionally because it tends to run 5–10 minutes quickly. In the older sections of the Heritage Center, we are also replacing quite a number of outlets and electrical switches with mother-of-pearl button switches and brass Beaux Arts panels that fit with the building's aesthetic.

In addition to increasing safety and lowering the possibility of fires or shortages, they also give many of the amazing rooms an additional layer of more beauty. Furthermore, we replaced broken carpentry and missing picture rails in several of the rooms' ceilings and added period-style stencil work. The grand staircase, seashell display, and rotunda will all get new exhibit spot lights. The original seraphine jewel water fountain's ornamental water feature and the atrium lights/sconces are the only two elements remaining to enhance the building's 1890s appeal. Your contributions are valued and useful for the Heritage Center's renovations!

## A Gift in Your Will or Living Trust

A gift in your will or living trust is one of the most effective ways to provide for the future of DMCHS and allows you to retain your assets during your lifetime. In addition, your estate may benefit from a charitable estate tax deduction.

The gift may be easily included in your will when it is written, or it may be added through a simple codicil or amendment. You may wish to leave DMCHS a stated dollar amount; a percentage of your residual estate (what remains after debts, taxes and specific bequests have been made); or a specific asset, such as securities or other marketable property.

It can be as simple as adding the following language to your last will and testament: "I give and bequeath to the Des Moines County Historical Society, presently of 501 N 4th Street, Burlington, IA 52601, the sum of \$\_\_\_ to be used for its general support."

#### Out of the Collection

#### **Standard Sioux Corliss Engine**

Ideally, museums have a wish list of items that fulfill their mission statement by adding value to their collection and narrative appeal. In many big museums, when industrialera machinery and automobiles are in working order, they are living monuments to history that inspire awe and astonishment in the general public. The Old Threshers Reunion is one of Iowa's largest events, drawing thousands of spectators each year. A unique look at the history of farming, printing, factories, railroads, and entertainment may be found there. You can ride steam locomotives, witness how steam tractors thresh heavy grass, and do a lot of other things.

The Des Moines County Historical Society is searching for steam engine parts in addition to riverboat memorabilia and salvage components. Our goal is to someday acquire an exceptional Corliss Steam Engine, which was produced at the Murray Iron Works. For more

than a century, these steam-powered single and compound engines effectively propelled the industrial era. While not created in Burlington, Iowa, the Murray Iron Works undoubtedly achieved perfection in them. In addition, Murray Iron Works featured both high- and low-pressure boilers to supply steam to stationary engines, turbineelectrical engines, and milling engines. Nowadays, many of these engines are

still in use, so we inquire in our community whether they have knowledge of the Murray Corliss engine.

According to a 1916 advertisement found in the Burlington Hawk Eye:

"Murray Corliss Engines are built either with girder frames, tangye frames, or rolling mill frames of our patented design. **The Standard Murray Corliss** is a girder frame engine built in sizes up to 18 x 42 inches, and capacities ranging from 50 to 600 H. P. **Murray Tangye Frame Corliss Engines** for extra heavy duty are built in sizes from 16 x 36 inches upward. Our **Rolling Mill Type Frame** for high pressure and high speeds is built for engines from 12 x 25 inches upwards.

Capacities range from 100 to 1300 H. P. **Tandem and Cross Compound Engines** are built for any load required. Murray Minor Corliss Engines, 20 to 70 H. P., are suitable for the smaller mills and factories. Ask for Catalog No. 65."

was contributed in 2013 by volunteers Bill and Pam Daws. In 1893, this picture was displayed at the Columbian Exposition in honor of the 400th anniversary of Columbia's arrival.


